<b>Message:</b>	<p>Regarding proposed changes to the Electricity Distribution Code, it was stated: The Commission welcomes feedback, discussions and meetings with stakeholders on the proposals set out in the draft decision by Friday 10 March 2023. The not-mentioned dis-incentive to report street light faults is the possibility that they won't get fixed in a timely fashion due to faults being the responsibility of parties other than SA Power Networks. If one looks at for example the area around the intersection of West Terrace and Port Road Adelaide, several lights are out and have been out for over a year. The SA Power Networks "Report a problem with a street light" web tool can highlight areas with lots of reported but unrepaired street lights marked in red, but as the fault is not the responsibility of SA Power Networks, there is no financial incentive for them to be fixed. It would be helpful if the Essential Service Commission could suggest how this situation could be improved under current and proposed regulatory frameworks, or failing that, at least acknowledge the problem and identify the parties failing to repair street lighting. I would welcome a meeting/discussion with the commission about this and [REDACTED]</p>
